Principal's Report

Dear NSC Families,

COVID continue to be present amongst our student and staff but in relatively small numbers. Thank you to everyone who has been conscientious in letting us know when there has been a positive case. If a student returns a positive test, they are to isolate for 7 days but do not need to retest before returning to school. If they still have symptoms, we ask they stay home until feeling well.

Our Sports Leadership group are to be congratulated on the excellent work they did running the sports program for Numurkah PS and St Joseph's students this week. Well done to this class and to their teacher, Danusia Sipa Borgeaud, on the preparation for this event and the leadership demonstrated.

NAPLAN testing has been completed and I would like to acknowledge the respectful way our Year 7 and 9 students worked in these sessions to ensure they were aiming to do their best and allowed others to stay focused on the tasks. Deanne Dewar did a wonderful job preparing for these sessions.

We value student voice to improve student engagement, wellbeing and quality instruction and are conducting a survey to find out what your child thinks of Numurkah Secondary College. The Attitudes to School Survey is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist schools in gaining an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. The survey focuses on the three key learning areas of: Learning, Experience at school and Student Health and Wellbeing. Our school will use the survey results to plan programs and activities to improve your child's schooling experience.

Many of our students have already completed the survey. We will continue to give opportunities for those who have been absent due to illness to complete to ensure we are able to obtain the best possible data from our student group. On Thursday, 12th May, students from the 'How do we colonise Mars?' class travelled to Melbourne for Mission to Mars workshops run by KIOSC at the Swinburne Wantirna campus. They spent Thursday night having dinner and shopping at Westfield Knox before retiring to their rooms in readiness for a full day of learning on Friday. Friday's workshops had students immerse themselves in the Mars and space environments via VR technology. They were tasked with fixing Rover vehicles and spacewalking from the International Space Station. They then tested building materials to cope with the extreme Mars environment and were challenged to find a way to build a building to withstand the extreme cold of Mars. After lunch, they programmed drones to fly within a specified area and to flip them was very entertaining. This was a great learning opportunity for our students, even if the bus trip was long. The Year 8/9 War elective has been exploring the events and conditions of the Western Front. They have been learning about trench warfare and the lives that Anzacs led, fighting in the Battle of the Somme. These are creative writing excerpts from two students in that class, imagining themselves at the Battle of the Somme.

Jacob Wooley (Year 9)

BANG! I woke up to the sound of gunfire and a piece of shrapnel cutting me across my right cheek. I jumped off the sandbags and picked up my riffle with the 8-inch bayonet strapped to the front end. I darted toward the front trench, in a couple of seconds I realised the number of bodies and how close the enemy had gotten. They were right on our doorstep, right in front of us. I raised my rifle to shoot, got one, got two, got three. I attempted to dash back just to be rammed down by our incoming soldiers. I scrambled back up onto my feet and grabbed my grenade and put it right in the middle of the Germans, wiping out many. Then I scrambled for my gun. I grabbed it with both hands, the once polished wood was now covered in mud. I begin to turn. BOOM! Then a sharp pain I my chest, I begin to feel dizzy. I'd been shot. A medic rushed to my aid, now everything was going black and fuzzy. I knew that this was where I would die and that there was nothing anyone could do to save me. I slowly drifted to the afterlife in his hands.

As I nearly dozed off to sleep, I felt something moving across my right hand. I opened my eyes and saw that it was a rat, it didn't bother me too much, nothing was new about it.

I soon got up to go to the latrines. My feet were in so much pain as I walked and the god awful smell in the trenches is something I will never get over.

I then arrived at the deep toilet and did my business there. As I was finishing up I heard something, "BANG!" It was enemy fire. I pulled m pants up and made my way back through the bendy zig-zaggy trenches to get to the first line, the front trench where we fired on the enemy.


As I was running all I could think about was why I came here. It was for my country. My religion had always revolved around my country and even though it pained me to leave my mum and younger brother and sister, I knew what I did was the right choice.

When I got to the front trench, I looked down at the ground to find dead bodies that weren't there before. One of them I recognised, it was my friend, Roger. He just lay there dead with his eyes open. I wanted to cry but I had to keep going so I closed his eyes and grabbed my rifle, then left.

I got into a safe position near the top of the trench and started to fire.

REAP to Read has kicked off again this year, with Layla Moreton being this week's home


reading **WINNER**. Layla read every night and remembered to bring her satchel in on Monday morning.

School Bus Service
