RACE—GOULBURN ("Raising Aspirations in Careers and Education - Goulburn")


Description/Educative Purpose:

NSC delivered this agri-tech education session to our Year 8 students again in 2024, to support curriculum in Science and Humanities (Introduction to Farming) and with the goal of encouraging future agricultural pathways for interested students. On Thursday 29th February NSC students learnt about coding tractors to make them run autonomously and livestock locating devices (GPS, collars, trackers).

RACE – GOULBURN ("Raising Aspirations in Careers and Education - Goulburn")

Funded through the Victorian Secondary Schools Agriculture Fund, this incursion was the first step for Numurkah SC as part of the Food and Fibre School to Industry Partnership Programs. Numurkah SC

entered into this partnership with CQ University Australia, Agriculture Victoria, and GM LLEN to create ongoing future agricultural educational experiences and encourage potential employment opportunities for our students.

People who want to get out in the field, into the office, into the lab, and into the ag classroom.

People who want to work with ideas and people who can make these ideas a reality.

People who can see the bigger picture and people who delve into the details.

The Food and Fibre School Industry Partnership Program is free for participating schools. It pairs industry and schools together to create a tailored program for students to explore the exciting world of agricultural work in this region. As Numurkah SC develops its connection with this partnership over time,



we will be looking to link with industry representatives to visit our school to share their agricultural industry journey. This aims to create valuable and unique learning opportunities for students to then step outside of the school environment and immerse themselves in the industry partner's workplaces as they get into the senior year levels. Industry visits will be facilitated by RACE Goulburn. Transport costs are included in this fully funded program.
