ENGAGEMENT AND WELLBEING

CYBERBULLYING AND ONLINE SAFETY

Cyberbullying is an ever-increasing problem facing young people today. Some of the statistics are alarming.

- Cyberbullying rates for people under the age of 14 have tripled since 2019
- May 2023 saw the highest level of incidents reported to the e-Safety Commissioner since records began in 2015.
- The reality is online interactions are now a part of a young person's life, so supporting responsible use is essential.

Numurkah Secondary College's community is not immune to these issues. As a school we continue to provide education, guidance and support for students to make good choices when online. We are also currently exploring new options to support our students further, with more detail to follow soon.

We need the entire school community to work together to reduce negative interactions and experiences online, and to support a safe online environment for all our students.

Having discussions with your student(s) about what is happening in their online world, and building a safe space where they can come to you if things go wrong is important. Knowing what apps students are using, risks involved and what to do to support them if something does go wrong is also critical.

It is a tricky space to navigate though, with new apps and sites springing up regularly! The e-Safety Commissioner can help parents and caregivers with information and strategies. Check out the links below to help build a stronger, and importantly safer online community for your students!

Food and Fibre Agricultural Excursion

On Friday the 18th of August, the Year 12 VCE VM students and Ms Robertson's Year 10 Business Management class attended a number of local agricultural businesses. Firstly, we visited Ian Goodin's dairy farm in Katunga. We met his cows and learnt all about how he runs his business. Our second visit was to Aussie Pride Produce in Tallygaroopna. They're a hydroponic farm which uses a number of innovative growing procedures. Our final stop of the day was How-Now Dairy in Numurkah. This excursion was a valuable insight into the world of agriculture and how each of these businesses adopt different management styles and procedures. We learnt about how an ethical dairy raises "happy cows", who aren't separated from their mothers and are raised antibiotic free. They choose to sell milk the old-fashioned way with cream on top. We even got to sample some delicious cheese from How-Now Dairy!
