
Year 7 Humanities

Year 11 PE

The Year 11 PE class were looking at musculoskeletal injuries and how injury risk can be reduced. As part of this, students looked at a variety of protective equipment used in different sports. Pictured are students testing out some of this equipment: Ryan (a batter in cricket), Jesse W (a baseball/softball catcher), Ben (skateboarding/scootering) and Jesse P (a field hockey goalie).



Year 10 Human Movement and Performance

Students in 'Human Movement and Performance' have been looking at the structure and function of the cardiovascular and respiratory systems. They used salt, water and silicone straws to help understand how dehydration can reduce our blood volume and make this thicker. Students have practiced measuring blood pressure at rest and whilst participating in different physical activities, and used stethoscopes to hear the sounds of their own heart pumping. They have also been looking at heart rate and things that can affect this. Students have also measured their resting and maximal tidal volume using balloons, and measured their respiratory rates whilst participating in physical activity at different intensity levels.
